

Words from the Chief...



Aaniin, Boozhoo Elders, Youth, and Citizens!

It's been an equally busy month taking meetings across in homelands. We have been fortunate to experience some nice weather over the course of the month and hoping that it can stretch a big longer! Our administration has been diligently working to get caught up in their respective departments with reporting and other important matters. effects of the pandemic has not only affected our communities but many others which has caused delays in reporting and interrupted our services. is stabilization, Our goal while improving and enhancing the operations of our community.

I was asked to share a few words at Steelworker Union's the United National Conference held in Sault Ste. I along with Chief Sayers welcomed the delegates and had an opportunity to share a few words. I spoke of the importance of safe spaces for our people who are in these Unions. It is so important that there is a zero-tolerance policy for racism and discrimination, and I spoke of the need to ensure that any type of situation or incident should handled appropriately and swiftly. I acknowledged the partnership we've been able to establish with our local chapter including the need for continued meaningful engagement and participation. We are working with some of their local executive on a project of creating a space for flags to be hung for the community. Those conversations will continue to happen and we're hoping to have something in place sooner than later. Aside from those initial conversations was a much bigger discussion about our need to work together in some of the projects that Garden River will be undertaking. understand the need collaborate with different sectors and we're trying to position our community to have good partners and stakeholders for whatever opportunities present themselves to Garden River.

With Indian Residential School work that is happening in different respective regions in Ontario, the Anishinabek Nation has facilitated discussions between communities a part of the political organization to discuss best practices and to support one another. communities are at different stages in this important work and Garden River is working to create the capacity that will assist the project in years to come. This will be a long process as we also hope to have discussions with the Federal government about Day School initiatives in the future.

The Ojibway Subdivision Watermain Project is slowly wrapping up. We're hoping that the improvements made in this area of our community will offer a reliable source with more fewer interruptions in services. The laying of asphalt and paving throughout this subdivision is underway, and I'd like to remind our citizens to please slow down in those residential neighbourhoods for the safety of our children, elders, and all other citizens. We will be meeting with our new Police Chief Jeff Skye to talk about a greater presence and more oversight in the enforcement of speeders through and around our community.

I participated in the Lake Huron Chiefs meetings for the Anishinabek Nation on October 13, 2022, where leaders within the region discussed the state of their community and an update. Garden River is not alone as many others are experiencing delays in reporting and the interruption of other projects. It is nice to see that our community continues to move forward with projects despite the setbacks but also on the cusp of implementing new developments which we hope to start in the spring 2023.

The Council has chosen the destinations for our Tiny Home Developments along

with the Transitional homes. We're excited for the work to begin which is set to begin in spring 2023. More information will be provided to membership in terms of updates and progress as it relates to the projects.

I along with the Council were invited to the Child Care Centre for their fall time harvest. I was able to catch the last part of the ceremony in the arbour with many of the children wearing ribbon skirts and shirts that were made by our elder Barb Nolan. It was a very beautiful event to witness and watch our children participate in the cultural and ceremonial customs of our people. Our little learners are like sponges and every time we expose them to our original values and traditions, the stronger the foundation for their development. It is my hope that we continue and embrace the traditions and customs in our Child Care Centre while incorporating our traditions which has always been a part of our people.

I travelled to Toronto to take part in a Joint Indigenous Services Canada discussion with other Chiefs in Ontario. The day consisted of updates, the introduction of the new Regional Director of ISC for Ontario Michael O'Byrne and send off the previous RGD Anne Scotten who is taking on a new role. We had a very good relationship in terms of the former RGD and we wish her well in her new role within Government. It was also another opportunity to connect with Chiefs to discuss collaboration of projects but also share our communities' updates. The meeting also included a presentation by Chiefs of Ontario on health to discuss the needs of our communities and some of the new initiatives being worked on by the PTO. This meeting also included a continuation of the discussions we had with ISC officials that Garden

River deals in relation to funding agreements, reporting and other opportunities.

The Council held its first new Quarterly General Assembly to introduce the Audit that was already approved and passed in 2020. Although it was passed, it was never introduced and presented to the community which provided an opportunity for members to ask questions and participate in the discussion. Our Council is committed to catching up with the financial reporting and we have another community session planned for December 2022 which we hope to provide the Audit for

2020-2021. We intend to carry out another session in the early new year to discuss the current Audit and begin regular quarterly reporting to our membership shortly after. I want to commend our finance department and our administrative team who have been working extremely hard to get caught up on regular reporting. We are quite confident that we will be on track and in a much better position in terms of the operations within our community.

As a community, we once again grieve the loss of some of members here in Garden River since the last update. We'd like to send out our prayers and thoughts to those families and members who are grieving and continue to grieve. May the creator look after each and every one of you and your families. I wish you all good health and happiness and until the next report, Baamaapii Giiwaabmin!

Community Members Needed for Garden River First Nation 2022/23 Indigenous Knowledge Study

What is the purpose of this Indigenous Knowledge study?

To gain information on:

- Terrestrial species at risk
- · Culturally important animals
- Environmentally important areas
- Traditional placenames
- · Cultural landscape features



Who we are looking for:

Garden River community members including elders, adults, and youth that have knowledge about local animal populations, environment, placenames in anishinaabemowin, cultural landscape features, and/or stories about the land.

Project timeline, honoraria, & contact info:

Interviews for this project will take place from **October to November 2022** at the Lands and Resources Department.

Each interview will take 40-90 minutes and participants will receive a tobacco offering and a \$250 honorarium. There are a limited number of time slots available for participants.

Project background:

This project is led by the Garden River Lands and Resources Department and supported by the Lands and Resource Portfolio Holders.

The data collected will be made into a report for the Garden River community. The project report will influence future policy creation, the development of a fish and wildlife management plan, and future projects for the Lands and Resources Department.

Personal information will not be shared in any reports and participants have the option to be interviewed anonymously.





Aanii / boozhoo Garden River,

The Lands Department and DFO are collaborating on learning more about invasive sea lamprey. Small surface drift nets were set in the Garden River and Root River and will catch juvenile sea lamprey on their way to the Great Lakes. We are catching sea lamprey to take them out of the aquatic ecosystem and to get an estimate of how many sea lamprey are in our rivers.

These types of nets do not normally harm native fish because most adult fish are able to swim out of them. The nets are also small and should not impede boat or canoe traffic in the river.

Public Notice: Garden River First Nation Shipman Letters/ Harvesting Permission Letters

Oct 19, 2022

What are Shipman Letters?

Shipman Letters are legal papers that give someone the right to hunt, fish, or harvest within the traditional territories of a community. Shipman letters can also be called Harvesting Permission Letters or Hunting and Fishing Permission Letters. These letters are called Shipman Letters because of the court case R. v. Shipman, 2007. Shipman was an Indigenous person that was charged with hunting moose outside of their traditional territory, but he had permission to hunt from the local Indigenous community and won the court case.

Who can give out Shipman Letters?

Shipman Letters can only be given out by the Chief and Council or a designated authority such as a Lands Department. Fish and wildlife are a communal right and responsibility and individual community members cannot give out Shipman Letters on behalf of a community.

Additional Info:

Garden River community members do not need a Shipman Letter to harvest within our traditional territory or Treaty area. Please seek permission from the nearest Indigenous community if you are planning to harvest outside of your traditional territory or Treaty area.

GRFN Policy on Shipman Letters:

Currently, GRFN does not have any policy on Shipman Letters and is therefore not giving out any Shipman Letters. Any Shipman Letters that were given out by GRFN in the past are void.

Conservation Officers are aware that GRFN does not give out Shipman Letters and will ticket anyone who claims that GRFN gave them permission to hunt or fish.

The GRFN Lands Department is planning to develop a policy for Shipman letters in the future. Leadership and the community will be consulted regarding this policy development.

For high school students preparing to graduate this year, keep in mind some key application dates with deadlines as a good reason not to delay.

Applications "Which ones do I need to submit?"

Firstly, if you are considering any Ontario colleges or universities, please check out the following websites for important information including the application process and deadline dates.

<u>www.ontariocolleges.ca</u> (for Ontario colleges) www.ouac.on.ca (for Ontario universities)

Do some research online and/or inquire with your school guidance counsellor if you're unsure of the process or are feeling that you're not quite sure which route to go or which path you should be taking. A lot of those decisions will be based on what credits you've achieved to date and what you're currently taking, academic or applied courses, etc.

Secondly, Garden River band members can then apply for sponsorship (funding) for their post-secondary studies through our department with Anne Marie Jones who is the Post-Secondary Counsellor and most may already know her. Sponsorship Application Deadlines Dates for Garden River Post-Secondary Sponsorship are:

For Spring/Summer (May-August): March 29th: For Fall (September-December): May 15th
For Winter (January-April): October 15th

Post Secondary

Post-Secondary:

First and foremost, with midterms upon you and/or with your midterm grades now reported, if you are experiencing any difficulties with your course work and if you haven't already done so, please visit your school's Student Services or Library or Accessibility Services or Indigenous Services to arrange for tutoring and extra help. Extra assistance is available for all students at most colleges/ universities but you must take the first step and ask for help. One good thing is that it is never too late to ask. I can help you navigate at your school to access these services at your school or drop in here at the GRFN Ed/Rec Center to meet with our tutors to see if they can assist you too.

With covid-19 still very much active, and with enrolment down at both Algoma University and Sault College, I am not scheduling any visits on campus just yet. However, as we all know, a **virtual meeting** is very easy. This makes it easier for all students to meet with me as needed.

Please feel free to send me a virtual meeting request using the meeting software/platform that you are comfortable with to schedule a meeting/visit or if you are in the GRFN area, you can also book an appointment to meet in person in my office by following proper protocols.

IMPORTANT FOR SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS and PARENTS....

GRADUATING FROM HIGH SCHOOL
THIS YEAR?

Although it is only November, and your last high school year has just started, you have some very important decisions to make soon.... namely are you going to continue your studies at COLLEGE OR UNIVERSITY?

Choosing the right college or university is an **important step** for YOU, one that will help **shape your**

future. Now is the time to research, soul search and plan your choices at an eligible college/university and find an eligible program at the postsecondary level. Talk to your family, friends, your guidance counsellor, your very own Garden River High School Liaison Worker, Stephanie Jones, and/ or call me - we are all ready, willing and able to help you **make** informed decision. This means researching your choices for an eligible college/university and their eligible programs. The good thing is that with the pandemic, schools have all added more information on their websites, Facebook pages, and other **social media. There** are additional resources online to help you make this IMPORTANT decision. The internet is an excellent tool to help you search for information on eligible schools and programs... visit the college or university's website and the following websites for valuable tips, links and other information:

Once you have researched carefully and decided what you want to take and where you want to go, your High School Guidance Counsellor will be helping you to open your application on Ontario College or University Application Service application at your high school.

Application for Post-Secondary Sponsorship from Garden River

In addition to the application to the schools, you must complete your Application for **Post-Secondary** Sponsorship from Garden River. Once you have completed both applications and you have received the "Acknowledgement Letter" from either OCAS or OUAS, GRFN will reimburse your cost for the base application fee (\$110 covers your first 5 college program choices and \$156 covers your initial 3 university program choices *** there may be supplemental fees depending on your university choices) after you submit your completed Garden River Application for **Post-Secondary Education Assistance** and your payroll deposit form.

If you are having difficulty making this very important decision, please feel free to contact me, Anne Marie Jones, for assistance. I am here to help you make informed decisions about your future educational plans and to help you understand how your post-secondary sponsorship works.

At the same time that you complete and submit your OCAS/OUAC application, you need to complete and submit your Garden River Application for Post-Secondary Education Assistance so that we can reimburse your OCAS/OUAC application fees.

There are always 4 forms that complete a GRFN Application or Post-Secondary Education Assistance

package for full-time sponsorship:

- 1. Application
- 2. Consent to Disclose and Verify Information
- 3. Student Contract
- 4. Release of Information

The forms are always available on our website at www.gardenriver.ca under the Post-Secondary section - Forms. The forms are fillable online. It is required that you use a digital signature or a copy of your original signature. Please DO NOT just type your name on the signature line as your application will be considered incomplete.







Public Health guidance

In addition to the many tools already in place to keep Ontarians safe, on the recommendation of the Chief Medical Officer of Health, Ontario is updating public health guidance to manage COVID-19 during the respiratory illness season this fall. Some key highlights include:



IN CONTACT

If you are in contact with someone who has tested positive for COVID-19, continue to self-monitor for symptoms, there is no longer a need to isolate but you should wear a mask for 10 days when in public



WEAR A MASK

If you are experiencing symptoms of COVID-19 such as Fever, Cough, or Runny Nose. Stay home from school, work and social events until your fever is gone and symptoms are improving. get a rapid antigen test (RAT), a PCR test. Wear a mask for 10 days after and avoid non-essential visits to high-risk individuals and settings


